SENIOR CITIZENS VISIT WLMS

"A most delightful time" was the concensus of opinion from the visitors, the students, and the staff following a two and one-half hour visit of six Senior Citizens with three groups of sixth grade students at Wilde Lake High School.

You may be as surprised as we were to learn that many of the students today rarely see their grandparents (2 out of 60).

It was planned by Mrs. Connie Robinson, counselor, to have a group of "grandparents" come visit the school and talk with the kids. The questions are very interesting.

From the kids:

"What were movies like? How much did they cost?"

"Were your schools big? What did you wear to school?"

"Did you have separate gyms for boys and girls?"

"What time did you have to get up to catch the school bus?"

"What were your books like?"

From the visitors to the kids:

"Do you like open space schools? Why?"

(End of questions because the kids kept them busy with answers of their own.)

Some of the replies included:

"We had a higher reading level in our day because we were drilled daily in phonics."

"We never knew any snow days."

"If the snow was really deep, parents hitched ahorse to a sled."

"We sat with all boys on one side of the room and girls on the other."

"School stopped for Black students in Howard County at grade six. We then had to go to Baltimore to high school."

"We had no school libraries; the library books were in each room."

"Sure we had fun but we had to be careful not to carry it too far. If we got into any trouble in school, we were punished at home. The teacher was always right insofar as the parents were concerned."

From the kids: "What do you think that we missed most which was very important to you when you were our age?"

Senior Citizens: "The first thing which comes to my mind is the ice cream parlor. A soda would last a long, long time as we talked, teased, laughed and found good friends."

"We could walk, explore, and go anywhere without fear of being bothered much less molested. Your parents must taxi you to ball games, dance classes, and music lessons. We walked and enjoyed it."

Please hurry back Gramps and Grams, we like you!" The participants were Edna Carter, President of Group, Alfred Cranwill, Robert and Edyth Myers, Inez Spehr, and Alva Cuddeback.

In the "ROOTS" survey, among seventh and eighth grade students, CHICKEN GEORGE was the overwhelming "favorite" character (38 to 41, respectively). The next "favorite" character was KUNTA KINTA (TOBY) (18 to 21). The seventh grade then chose FIDDLER, while the eighth grade liked BLACK TOM MOORE.

The remaining eighth grade "favorites" were: KIZZY, FIDDLER, OLD GEORGE, YOUNG KUNTA KINTA, BELLE and ARLENE.

The remaining seventh grade "favorites" were: BLACK TOM MOORE, KIZZY, OLD GEORGE, and YOUNG KUNTA KINTA.

The "most disliked" character of both seventh and eighth grades was the Store Owner, MR. BRENT (30 to 20, respectively). WHITE MASTER TOM MOORE was the next most distiked character (24 to 19).

Seventh graders described their reactions as: angry, alright, bad, beautiful, cruel, discouraging, educational, excellent, exciting, freedom, fantastic, good, great, interesting, ignorant, memorable, perfect, powerful, prejudiced, sad, spectacular, super, superb, terrific, unbelievable, and unfair.

Highth graders described their reactions as: astonishing, adventurous, bad (meaning good), breath-taking, cook, corny, disbelief, determination, disgusting, dynamite, enjoyable, excellent, exciting, fabulous, fascinating, freaky, good, great, happy, hell (It was hell for the slaves.), heart-breaking, interesting, magnificent, memorable, moving, mean, neat, overcoming, outstanding, sad, sensational, so-so, strong, terrific, truthful, ugly, upset, and wonderful.

As part of this Survey, the Seventh and Eighth Graders want to thank Alex Haley for painstakingly searching out his past Black Family History and sharing his ancestors' experiences with us so that we now have a much better understanding of the truth concerning the black oppression.

WIMS STUDENTS "WOW EM" AT J.H.U.

Twelve Wilde Lake Middle School students recently participated in the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test given by the Study of Mathematically Precocious Youth (SMPY) program's Fourth Annual Mathematics Talent Search at Johns Hopkins University. The results of the testing tells us that Bruce E. Kendall will receive a special award for combined verbal and math score of 1200 which placed him in the top eleven contestants. 873 students from different areas of Maryland participated in the program. Andrey R. Taylor will receive special honor for scoring more than 500 on the SAT-math and more than 430 on the SAT-verbal. Audrey's scores placed her in the top 89 participants. John D. Villasenor and Deborah A. Bigles will both receive awards for scoring higher than 500 on the SAT-M. Wade R. Smith, Louis A. Eisenhauer, and John M. Hamilton will receive awards for scoring higher than 430 on the SAT-V.

On top of all of this good news WEMS will receive a certificate of Distinction and a copy of two books (Mathematical Talent and Intellectual Talent). The awards coremony will be held at the JHU Homewood Campus on Saturday, March 12, at 2:00-4:000.m. The assembly will be held in Shriver Hall. Shriver Hall seats 1100 persons, so feel free to attend the ceremony. Everyone at Wilde Lake Middle School is very proud of all our representatives. Special congratulations is extended to those students who performed at unusually high levels.


Dear Rem
